3.3 Pennant Selection Committees

The Club competes in two totally separate pennant competitions: Saturday and Tuesday pennant. We have four divisions in both Saturday and Tuesday pennant and (see Section 5.1 for more details).

There is a separate selection committee for each pennant competition. Selectors are elected by Club members at the Club's Annual General Meeting. Selectors are responsible for all selection decisions. These decisions must be based on the Club's goals and the selection criteria in an impartial and non-discriminatory manner.

The Club has a 2024-25 Selection Policy which can be found on the Club's website (on the Governance page). All bowlers must make themselves familiar with this important policy.

4. MEMBERSHIP FEES

Several categories of membership are available with varying fees for each category. The club offers the following membership types for 2024/25:

- Full adult membership - \$180 (allows you to play pennant competition)
- Dual and unaffiliated membership - \$90
- Student Membership - \$45
- Junior membership - \$45
- Social membership - \$40

Membership fees are set at the Annual General Meeting each year and are payable annually in advance of each season and may be paid directly to the Treasurer or by direct debit. If you are intending to play pennant, you must be a full financial member prior to playing your first pennant game.

5. CLUB FACILITIES

5.1 Greens

The bowling greens are generally open from September to April. As a member you are entitled to use the greens for practice at any time other than:

- when official games such as pennant games and tournaments are being played
- before 11.00 am each day (to allow greens staff to prepare the surface)
- if the greens are closed by the Greens Director, greenkeeper, or other club official.

It is likely that main clubhouse green will be closed on Sundays for deep watering. The smaller Bill Innes Green may be open for social bowls on Sundays. Please consult with the Greens Director (Graeme Nicholson) for further information on this matter.

5.2 Bar and clubhouse facilities

The bar and clubhouse facilities are open to members and their guests during the bowls season on practice nights and also on Saturdays. The usual opening times are:

- Wednesdays from 4.00 pm to approximately 8.30 pm
- Fridays from 4.00 pm to approximately 8.30 pm
- Saturdays from 12.30 pm to approximately 8.30 pm (in pennant season).

Members playing away are encouraged to return to the Club after their game to enjoy the company of other members and reflect on the day's play – and hopefully to celebrate a win.

During the non-bowling season, the clubhouse and bar are open for members and their guests on Fridays from 4.00 pm to approximately 8.30 pm.

Please note: Bar closing times are dependent upon the number of members present.

5.3 Clubhouse security

The clubrooms have an alarm system monitored by Sectrol Security, and both external and internal cameras which are connected to a computerised recording system.

Each member is given a fob that permits access to the clubrooms out-of-hours. There is a special reader mounted on the external wall next to the door that faces the main green. Just tap the fob on this device and the door will unlock automatically. This process will not give you access to the main part of the clubhouse, but will give you access to the foyer, notice boards, toilets and main storage room where the mats and jacks and other equipment is stored. Some bowlers leave their bowls bags and other equipment in this room.

Please make sure you close the external door when you leave.

If you require access to other parts of the clubrooms, please contact the Club's Secretary (Lyn Treweek), or another member who can disarm the alarm and unlock the main internal door.

5.4 Club facilities for hire

The Club facilities are available for hire to both members and the general public. It is a great facility for weddings, parties, funerals, wakes, meetings, etc. Members get a discounted rate. Go to the Club's website for more information (click [Club room hire](#) link).

6. PENNANT

6.1 Saturday and Tuesday pennant

Pennant is the main competition offered by the Club. To play pennant you need to be a full (affiliated) member. They are open competitions, that is, both men and women play in both competitions. As mentioned previously, there are two separate pennant competitions:

- **Saturday pennant** is a graded competition starting with Division 1 and going through to Division 9.

Details:

- 18 rounds (Round 1 on **5th October 2024** through to Round 18 = 22nd February 2024).
- Finals commence 1st March 2025
- Roll up = 1.00 pm and start time = 1.15 pm
- Break at 2.45 pm for 30 minutes.

We have four teams in Saturday pennant:

- Division 2 (4 rinks per team for a total of 16 players)
- Division 3 (4 rinks per team for a total of 16 players)
- Division 5 (4 rinks per team for a total of 16 players)
- Division 9 (2 rinks per team for a total of 8 players)

- **Tuesday pennant** is a graded competition starting with Division 1 and going through to Division 5.

Details:

- 18 rounds (Round 1 on **1st October 2024** through to Round 18 = 18th February 2024).
- Finals commence 25th February 2025
- Roll up = 10.00 am and start time = 10.15 am
- Break at 11.45 pm for 30 minutes.

We have four teams in Tuesday pennant:

- Division 1 (3 rinks per team for a total of 12 players)
- Division 3 (3 rinks per team for a total of 12 players)
- Division 4 (3 rinks per team for a total of 12 players)
- Division 5 (2 rinks per team for a total of 8 players)

Green Fees are payable for each pennant game you play and are paid on the day. This fee, like the annual membership fees, is set at the Annual General Meeting. Green fees are to be retained at \$10.00 for the 2024-25 season.

6.2 Pennant selection

- All players are asked to read and ensure they understand the Club's Selection Policy. This policy is emailed to all members and is available on the Club's website at <https://buninyongbowlingclub.com.au/governance>
- The Saturday Pennant selection committee (5 members) meets on Wednesdays and the teams are posted on the club noticeboard that evening. Teams are also emailed to members, posted in Bowlslink, and put in the Ballarat Courier.

- If you are unavailable on a particular Saturday, please place your name under the appropriate date on the Unavailability Sheet on the club noticeboard. (Please do this as soon as you know that you will be unavailable – no matter how many weeks in advance it might be).
- If you have any queries/issues regarding your **own** selection, please book a time to meet with the selection committee as per the Selection Policy or see a Player Advocate. Individual selectors should never be approached regarding your selection inquiries without an appointment.
- Please remember that selection is a very difficult task and that our selectors are important volunteers who are trying to select the best teams for the overall success of our club. It is not possible to please all players all the time and there will always be valid reasons for selections, so please make an effort to communicate with the selectors rather than criticising them.

6.3 Game day procedures

- If your team is playing Away, team members generally car-pool and travel together. Players meet at the clubrooms (meeting times are included with the team sheets) and leave from there.
- If you wish to travel directly to a game, please put your name on the Travel Direct list in the clubrooms, so that Side Managers will know who has already gone.
- Each team has a Side Manager, whose responsibility it is to make sure all players are present, organise what rinks each team plays on, toss to see which team bowls first (usually termed 'who gets the mat') and manage team sheets, green fee collection and results.
- Green fees are collected in each rink by the Second.

6.4 Game play

- Matches may be played over 21 ends. The conditions of play are advertised before the start of the season (these can be found on the [Ballarat Highland Bowls Region](#) website).
- Each bowler bowls two bowls (alternating with their opposition player), in order, that is, Lead, Second, Third, Skipper.
- Before the actual match starts, there is a two-end practice session, commonly called a 'roll-up'. This is conducted in the same order that the match will be played and allows bowlers to assess the speed of the green, the wind and any other conditions that may be relevant.
- The team whose turn it is to bowl first is said to 'have the mat'.
- If you are the Lead bowler in your team, it is your job to position the mat and roll the kitty down before you bowl your first bowl.
- When you are not actually bowling, it is recommended to move back and stand on the bank to watch, not remain on the green.
- Your Skipper will instruct you as to what he / she wants you to bowl (or at least try to bowl).
- After the first three bowlers have bowled both their bowls, players swap ends and the two Skippers bowl their two bowls.
- When the Skippers are bowling, only the 3rd players remain on the green at the head (where all the bowls are), and they will instruct the Skippers as to the current situation and what they want the Skippers to do.

- After all bowls have been bowled, the two 3rds will look at all the bowls (called the 'head') and agree on which bowls are closest, including measuring if needed, and then communicate the score to the 2nds who keep the scorecard and also change the scoreboard (only 3rds measure – other bowlers are to remain off the green while measuring is being done). If the 3rds cannot agree, they will call for an umpire.
- Scores are kept according to which team's bowls are nearest to the kitty (also called the jack or cat). The team with the closest bowl to the kitty has the 'shot' bowl. One shot is awarded for every bowl that is closer to the kitty than the opposition's closest bowl.
- After the score has been called by the 3rds, players (with the exception of the lead from the side who has won the end) collect the bowls. In order to keep the game moving the lead from side who won the end should collect and place the mat in readiness for the next end to proceed when all bowls are behind the mat.
- At the end of the match, when all rinks have completed the required number of ends, the total 'shots up' are added up for both teams and the winning team is the team with the highest number of shots.
- Ten (10) points are awarded to the winning team and two (2) points for each rink won, so the maximum possible score is eighteen (18) points (in a 4-rink match).

7. OTHER BOWLING ACTIVITIES OFFERED BY CLUB

The Club offers a large range of bowling activities other than pennant for both new and experienced bowlers.

7.1 Club games

Club games are internal competitions, that is, members of the Club play each other in selected competitions. The competitions available to men are as follows:

- Men's Singles Championship
- Men's Pairs Championship
- Men's President's Handicap
- Men's Two-Bowls Event
- Men's Minor Championship

The competitions available to female members are:

- Ladies' Singles Championship
- Ladies Pairs Championship
- Ladies President's Handicap
- Ladies 100-Up Event
- Ladies Novice Event
- Ladies' Fours Tournament.

The two match committees (discussed in Section 3.4) put a call out for members to play in these competitions around September each year. If you intend to enter, you simply fill out an entry form and pay a fee (usually \$5.00) for each competition you play in.

Please note: The winners of the Club's singles championships go on to play in the regional Champion of Champions Singles competition (see the [BHBR Champions](#) webpage for further information).

7.2 Club tournaments

The Club has four tournaments each year.

- Open Triples Tournament – usually run about November each year
- Open Fours Tournament – usually run about February each year

- Ladies Irish Fours Tournament (for women only) – usually run mid-March (near St Patrick's Day)
- Mixed Triples Tournament (includes men and lady bowlers) – usually run about April each year.

The Men's Match Committee oversee the first three tournaments while the Ladies Match Committee organises the Irish Fours tournament. Usually, a call out for teams a month before each tournament. If you would be interested in playing in any of these tournaments, but not confident in asking others to form a team, talk to someone from the respective match committee and they will chase a team for you.

7.3 Social bowls

When the greens become available (usually in September each year), the Club will organise social bowls probably each Sunday morning. Social bowls provides the opportunity for community members (usually non-bowlers) to learn about how to play bowls in a fun non-competitive environment. Usually, the Club provides a BBQ and coaching staff make themselves available to aid. The Club will get in touch with members and the community when the social bowls days and dates have been finalised.

7.4 Corporate Cup

The Corporate Cup is run for six weeks in February/March year on Thursdays starting at 6.00pm. About 24 teams compete each year. It is a very popular event, and teams are booked well in advance. The event is essentially for non-bowlers, however experienced bowlers help supervise teams if required. Members are asked to help run the event, for example, setting up, operating the BBQ, selling tickets, or working behind the bar.

7.5 Practice sessions

Official practice times are:

- Wednesday afternoon from 3.00 pm onwards (or earlier if you would like), and
- Friday afternoon from approx. 3.00 pm onwards (or earlier if you would like).

7.6 Coaching sessions

The Club has several members who are qualified coaches. If you would like individual coaching contact one of the following coaches:

Group coaching sessions will also be conducted throughout the season. The sessions will focus on skills, strategies, and team roles, with practice activities to follow the teaching session. Times for group coaching sessions will be advertised.

7.7 Regional competitions

Members of the Club can participate in all regional (BHBR) competitions except the Champion of Champions Singles event (you need to have won the Club's singles championship to compete in this event). Options include:

- Mixed pairs
- Men's fours
- Women's fours
- Men's triples
- Women's triples

- Men's pairs
- Women's pairs
- Men's singles
- Women's Singles
- Over 60 Men's Singles
- Over 60 Women's Singles
- Over 60 Men's Pairs
- Over 60 Women's Pairs
- Men's Champion of Champions Singles (for club champions only)
- Women's Champion of Champions Singles (for club champions only)

To enter these events, you need to register via Bowlslink. A Bowlslink ID is required to enter all regional events with payment by credit card made at time of entry. For more information go to the [BHBR Championships](#) webpage.

7.8 Umpires/markers

Umpires officiate at important games, rule on matters of law if the team skippers disagree, measure bowls when the Thirds call for a decision, and ensure that the laws of the game are observed by all players. Official umpires are members who have completed the umpires' course.

Markers are used in singles games to keep the score card, set the jack and indicate information pertaining to the head when asked by players.

Players may nominate via the club Secretary to complete the umpire and/or markers course. Members may also be asked to 'mark' a club competition match for members. The club runs a 'Marking' instruction session early in the season.

8. UNIFORMS

Club uniform must be worn for all pennant games and also for Club championship finals. The Club uniform consists of:

- Club shirt (see image right - available through the Club)
- Bottle green trousers or shorts
- White socks
- Bowls approved shoes
- Club jacket/vest (optional – available through the Club)
- Hat (with approved hatband – available through the Club), cap, or beanie (optional).



Approved bowls attire (with the Bowls Australia emblem) must be worn for all tournament events, but this does not necessarily have to be your Buninyong Bowling Club uniform. Many players wear different club or 'tournament' shirts and clothing.

All visible bowls attire must have the Bowls Australia emblem. It is also recommended that all players wear a name tag. These can be ordered through the club Secretary. All items listed above (other than those available from the Club) are available at the Ballarat Bowls Shop

9. HEALTH AND SAFETY

9.1 Health and safety while playing bowls

While lawn bowls is hardly regarded as a dangerous game, there is still the need to be careful around the greens.

Please be aware of the step down from the bank to the green as this drop can sometimes catch you unaware. Also on the bank are jack markers, number discs and rink boundary markers. On the green, bowls are scattered around the head or the mat. A good idea to remember is to never walk backwards on the green. Not only might you trip over something, but you might also knock a bowl out of position.

Also, for the health and safety of our members, and for legal reasons, please remember **smoking** is only permitted in designated areas, and the consumption of **alcohol** is not permitted on the green.

9.2 Members' protection

10. ETIQUETTE

Bowls etiquette can be defined as the unwritten laws of sportsmanship, courtesy and respect that make the game more enjoyable to all who are taking part in the game including players and spectators. Friendly and sporting acts towards team-mates and opponents should be appreciated and reciprocated. We should all approach our bowls with enthusiasm, friendliness, and tolerance.

Please remember that our bowling greens are precious and at times delicate. The wearing of flat soled bowling shoes plays a big part in keeping our greens in good condition and are the only shoes that should be worn. Shoes with rippled soles or heels should never be worn on the greens.

Some examples of etiquette are:

- Never clap a bad bowl from your opponent or express delight that they have missed their shot.
- Always stand well back from the mat when your opponent is bowling.
- When changing ends, avoid straying onto the neighbouring rinks – walk within your own rink boundaries.
- The control of the mat lies with the bowler on the mat from the time of delivery until their bowl comes to rest.
- Remain aware of what is happening in the game and be ready for when it is your turn to bowl.
- It is the usual custom to offer your direct opponent a drink after the game.
- Always be punctual for a match.

11. VOLUNTEERING AT YOUR CLUB

To enable the Club to function and to keep fees as affordable as possible, we rely on the generosity of our members to volunteer for at least one of the various volunteering opportunities available throughout the year. It could be helping at the bar or preparing food on Friday nights, attending working bees, assisting with catering efforts or other Club roles. Remember many hands make light work. If you could help us out with any of these or other activities, contact the President or Secretary for further information.
